R' Yissachar Dov of Belz was once in Vienna for health reasons when he became enchanted by the sound of someone learning gemara. Curious, he went to see who it was and was deeply moved by what he found. There, in military uniform, was a Jewish soldier in his uniform using his brief time off from duty to immerse himself in Torah learning. The Rebbe remarked, "This Jew is holding back the redemption!" He explained that naturally a soldier on leave would seek rest or entertainment. But this soldier chose to learn gemara, bringing Hashem immeasurable joy.

"Imagine the pleasure this gives to Hashem. A pleasure so great that it may delay the redemption, because when Moshiach comes, Hashem will miss this precious joy."



This story remains as relevant today as ever, reminding us of the countless IDF soldiers in Gaza, Lebanon and elsewhere who devote their rare free moments to Torah study.

Jeering and Cheering

At times we may get upset and berate at ourselves for something we did. We knock ourselves with statements like, "I am so dumb for doing that." What would be our response if it was someone else who did that? we must follow the principle, "Don't do to yourself what you wouldn't do to others." Would you criticize a comrade if he gave a less than stellar speech? Would you think less of a friend if he didn't score high on a test?

The Mishna tells us אדם בשמחה דו מקבל את כל האדם בשמחה, receive every person cheerfully.¹ The wording כל includes ourselves. That is to say, we must receive ourselves happily, even if we made a foolish mistake.

Cheap and Expensive

People tend to place more honor or value on things that are expensive and give less respect to things that are cheap. For example, when people charge more for their services, their clients value it more.

This is alluded to in the words of Lashon Hakodesh. The word יקר, expensive is a synonym for כבוד, honor.² On the other hand, זול, cheap, also means something low and degraded as in זלוול.
