"But I'm a Socialist"

Personal socialist ideology shouldn't prevent exploring Judaism; Torah contains great principles of social justice; tzedakah based on justice not *just compassion; "He who has pity on the poor, lends unto G-d."*

...It came as something of a surprise to me to read in your letter that Socialism prevented you from learning about Judaism. It is noteworthy that one of the first laws dealt with in the Torah, immediately after the Revelation at Sinai, was the legislation relating to an individual who sold himself into slavery. Some of the laws are designed to protect the individual's material and spiritual well-being, personal dignity and so forth, to the extent that our Sages observed that, "He who acquires a slave, acquires a master for himself." In any case, the maximum period of servitude could not exceed six years. Furthermore, the Torah emphasizes the basic principle that all Jews have only one master, namely G-d Himself, stating, "For you are My servants, whom I have brought out of the land of Egypt." In other words, whatever the difference in the material position, all are basically free and the only servitude they have to render is to G-d.

Similarly, the concept of tzedoko, the help that one has to give to another both materially and spiritually, is based not simply on human compassion, which is a relative term, but on justice. Moreover, in this connection, it is written, "He who has pity on the

poor, lends unto G-d." (Prov. 19:17). This means that when a person helps a poor man, he makes G-d his debtor, so to speak, for G-d takes upon Himself the obligation to repay the money and effort expended in behalf of the poor man and to do so in a generous measure.

This is hardly the place to enlarge upon this topic, but I trust that it will suffice to indicate the great principles of social justice which the Torah has made basic to Judaism. In any case, you could discuss these matters further with your Lubavitch friends which you mention.

I trust that you will go from strength to strength in your advancement in Judaism and at a more rapid pace, in order to make up for lost time in the past. It is well to bear in mind that since you have a special influence in a certain circle, every personal advancement of yours will be multiplied in the persons who will benefit from it.

5 Spiritual Poverty Too

Sholom uBrocho:

I received your letter, in which you ask how can you observe the Mitzvah of Gemilus Chassodim being at the Yeshiva.

Surely you know that, as it is explained in the Gemoro and many other sources, Gemilus Chassodim can be observed not only with money but in many other ways, and, moreover, not only in regard to the poor, but also the rich.¹⁰ Even Tzedoko, which is to help the poor, is not limited to those who are poor materially, but also to those who are poor spiritually.¹¹ Needless to say, the plain meaning of the words — in terms of money — is not to be excluded.

Furthermore, and this is essential, if there is no poor man present, it is possible to hand over the money to a Gabbai-Tzedoko, who is the representative of the poor (or to put it in a box) to be turned over to the poor eventually.

The auspicious and opportune times to give Tzedoko is before prayer,¹² and before fulfilling any Mitzva in general.¹³ Of course, when a poor man is present and asks for a donation, that is when one also fulfills the commandment "you shall not shut off your hand from your needy brother."14

With regard to the question of College for Yeshiva boys, my opinion is well known, and it has been amply publicized, and all the aspects are discussed.¹⁵ I trust my position is known to you.

In line with the aspiration which you express in your letter, I trust you have a regular shiur in Chassidus every day, with increased time on Shabbos. We have been assured that when a person sanctifies himself a little in his daily life here below, he is sanctified a great deal from On High,16 and may you go from strength to strength in all matters of Torah and Mitzvoth, in accordance with the teachings of the Chanukah lights which we light in growing number from day to day.

P.S. Inasmuch as you invite my suggestions in regard to the Will, a matter which in this country is an accepted practice to make it early in life, and it is a Segula for long life²⁰—I will offer the following suggestions, although I do not, of course, touch upon any of the aspects relating to investments and the commercial handling of the estate, etc.

Firstly, there is in my opinion an omission of an essential point, namely the matter of Tzedoko. To be sure, those who will, after one hundred and twenty years, inherit their share of the estate will, please G-d, make provisions for the distribution of tzedakah of their own good will. Nevertheless it is a personal Mitzvo to provide for Tzedoko rather than to leave it for others to do so, even the closest members of the family. Moreover, the provision for Tzedoko should be one of the first clauses of a Jewish Will.

Needless to say, the amount of Tzedoko provided for in the Will should be according to the generosity of the testator. But if you wish my opinion in this matter, I would suggest that the amount so provided should be שמח (one fifth) of the net estate, with the proviso that the distribution of the Tzedoko should not be delayed until the whole estate is properly and fully evaluated, but that a proportionate amount of any and all distributions under the Will should automatically be deducted for Tzedoko...²¹

May G-d grant that you should have good news to report in all the above.


